Graduated From Wheaton

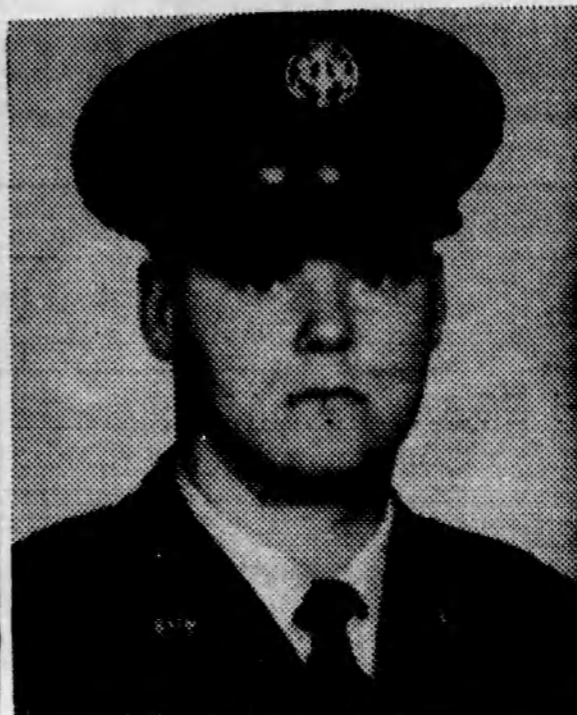
